We appreciate all the effort that families are making to ensure that students don't come to school if they are feeling unwell. We know that this means families are using their supply of RATs responsibly. This has greatly reduced the number of students who are presenting at school with COVID-19 symptoms. While students are COVID-19 negative, the number of students with cold and flu has made a sharp rise in recent weeks. Be reminded that it is still vitally important that students with cold and flu symptoms remain at home until they are symptom free and come to school only when they are well.

Free Flu Shots from 1 June!

Please see this important message from NSW Health

Free flu jab will be available to all NSW residents in a month-long blitz from June 1 in an effort to combat this year's expected severe influenza season. With a sharp increase in flu cases already, the NSW Government will fund flu vaccinations at GPs and pharmacies until June 30. "We strongly urge everyone over six months of age to get a flu shot as soon as possible to protect themselves and their loved ones, as the virus is easily spread and potentially deadly. " Dr Chant said. NSW Health has also permitted pharmacies to administer flu vaccines to children aged five years old, reduced from 10 years, making it easier for families to be vaccinated together. Other protective measures individuals can take include staying at home if sick and washing your hands. Late arrivals

In the last few weeks, we have seen a consistent pattern of some students arriving late to school. Whilst a couple of minutes here and there does not mean much, regular missed time at school can have a negative impact on children. Lateness to school can increase anxiety in children. Often lateness contributes to children missing daily organisation explicitly articulated to the class, the first part to their literacy session, an opportunity to change their home reader or hand in notes. Your child's best learning time starts at the beginning of every day. Arriving to school on time is important in positively setting up your child's learning for the day. Please ensure that your child/ren arrive at school by 9:20am. This will support establishing good habits of punctuality, organisation skills and contribute towards positive learning experiences. Thank you to all parents and carers who continue to work in partnership with regular attendance and punctuality.





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Keeping everybody safe



DOUBLE PARKING

Do not double park at any time. Double parking is illegal and dangerous especially around school It reduces visibility and blocks the road for other motorists.

FINE EXCEEDS \$349 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

U TURNS

- Performing U turns or 3 point turns in school zones is extremely dangerous.
- Performing U turns across unbroken centre lines is illegal and is particularly dangerous around schools.

FINE EXCEEDS \$349 + 3 DEMERIT POINTS

PARKING/STOPPING **NEAR INTERSECTIONS**

It is illegal to park or stop less than 10m from an intersection without lights as this blocks visibility for turning drivers and creates a hazard for all motorists.

FINE EXCEEDS \$464 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS

PEDESTRIAN CROSSINGS & CHILDREN'S CROSSINGS

- Slow down as you approach pedestrian crossings and children's crossings.
- Do not proceed if the road beyond the crossing is blocked.
- Do not stop or park in the No Stopping zones on either side of the crossing as this blocks visibility.
- At a children's crossing you must stop at or before the stop line if there is a pedestrian about to cross or already on the crossing.
- Do not proceed through a children's crossing until all pedestrians have completely cleared the crossing.

FINE EXCEEDS \$581 + 4 DEMERIT POINTS

NO STOPPING ZONES

No Stopping signs mean you must not stop here at any time. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times.

An unbroken yellow kerb line is a no stopping line. You must not stop for any reason.

FINE EXCEEDS \$349 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS






BUS ZONE SIGNS

A Bus Zone is a No Stopping zone for vehicles other than buses. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction applies only at those times.

You must not park your vehicle less than 20 metres before or 10 metres after a bus stop.

FINE EXCEEDS \$349 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS





NO PARKING ZONES

You can only stop in a No Parking zone while picking up or setting down passengers or goods. You have a maximum of 2 minutes from the time you stop and must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle at all times. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the

FINE EXCEEDS \$194 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS





DRIVEWAYS AND FOOTPATHS

- When exiting or entering a driveway a vehicle must give way to pedestrians on the footpath.
 Driveways are not playgrounds. Be aware that children can go unnoticed in front and behind your vehicle. Do not solely rely on reverse sensors or cameras in your vehicle.
- Always supervise and hold a child's hand near/
- It is illegal to park in or across any driveway or to block a footpath at any time.

FINE EXCEEDS \$349 + 2 DEMERIT POINTS



TIME RESTRICTED PARKING

Parking signs with specified time limits allow drivers to park their vehicle for a maximum period of time, eg 5 minutes, 1 hour etc. If times of operation are shown on the sign, the restriction

FINE EXCEEDS \$116





USING MOBILE PHONES

- It is illegal to make or receive a call on your mobile phone while you are driving unless your phone is secured in a fixed mounting or does not require you to touch or manipulate the
- Using mobile phones is a major distraction for drivers and incurs higher fines and demerit points in school zones.
